

CULTIVATE HOPE, RESTORE THE EARTH

IN THE EARLY 1980s, during hurricane relief efforts in the Dominican Republic, Tom Woodard recognized a link between rural poverty and environmental degradation, particularly the cutting of trees used for charcoal and firewood. These trees were vital income sources for farmers, but excessive woodcutting left watersheds vulnerable and farmland degraded. Tom was motivated to answer a critical question: How could rural farming families meet their immediate need for nutrition and income, while at the same time protect and restore the land on which their lives depend?

Tom realized that in encouraging farmers to implement agroforestry (integrating trees into farming systems) they could break the cycle of degradation, equipping farmers to increase their income while improving the land. This approach not only helped the farmers eradicate poverty but also

brought many environmental benefits. Trees enriched the soil, provided shade, and created habitats for wildlife. This was the beginning of Plant With Purpose.

Today, Plant With Purpose works in nine countries and has successfully equipped 478,302 individuals to heal their land, lift themselves out of poverty, and live with dignity and hope. We continue to address the root causes of rural poverty and deforestation through a holistic approach.

Plant With Purpose is about faith in action, inspired by a belief to steward creation and to care for vulnerable communities. Our work is rooted in relationships—with the environment, our neighbors, and our Creator. Our philosophy of "partners, not projects" defines our connection with donors, international partners, and farmers, cocreating a world where hope blooms and the Earth flourishes.

COMMUNITY DESIGNED RESTORATION®

WHAT SETS PLANT WITH PURPOSE APART

is our holistic approach to community development, which we call Community Designed Restoration® or CDR. This approach puts program interventions in the hands of local communities and includes agroforestry, tree planting, and land restoration projects. CDR is a game-changing innovation among global tree planting approaches due to its hyperlocal, participatory model, enhancing ecosystem resilience while reducing poverty.

Plant With Purpose communities applying CDR experience a 55% average reduction in poverty—some much higher. CDR promotes

sustainable management of natural resources and the restoration of degraded lands, benefiting even future generations. These efforts ensure access to vital ecosystems, including clean water and more fertile soil, which can boost agricultural vields and the health of rural households. By improving land conditions, farmers can produce marketable products such as fruits, nuts, timber, and non-timber resources. This directly increases household incomes, making communities more resilient to economic shocks. Most exciting, this change continues even after graduation from our program.

THEORY OF CHANGE

THE CHALLENGE OF POVERTY IS MULTIFACETED, with environmental, economic, and spiritual dimensions. For this reason, we acknowledge that the solution to a challenge as complex as poverty must be equally holistic in its nature. At Plant With Purpose, we address poverty through a comprehensive **Theory of Change.** Our Theory of Change guides our work by helping us to connect specific activities such as tree planting with the "big picture" of environmental, economic, and spiritual transformation we are working to achieve. This approach invites our partners into an ongoing process of collaboration and consensus. Our work is deeply rooted in Christian values, and our tested Theory of Change acknowledges the complexities of poverty that extend beyond economics. By addressing the multidimensional layers of poverty, touching the environmental and social aspects, we fulfill our Christian mission, caring for God's creation, promoting economic justice, and nurturing spiritual transformation within communities experiencing poverty. Integrating economic, spiritual, and environmental dimensions leads to greater measurable and sustainable impact.

Our tested Theory of Change acknowledges the complexities of poverty that extend beyond economics.

Environmental Restoration

We believe our faith calls us to be stewards of creation. Our Theory of Change recognizes that sustainable land use, reforestation, and agriculture are vital for both the environment and poverty alleviation. Tree planting is a key part of this effort, symbolizing hope and serving as an investment in better soil, water, and future crop yields. This year, farming families planted an impressive 9,904,936 trees, while agricultural training sessions garnered a cumulative attendance of 67,715. These numbers reflect the participants' unwavering commitment to land revitalization and their firm belief that their efforts are positively transforming the lives of their families and communities.

The Watershed Model

Our Watershed Model is a territorial and whole-system approach that effectively combats poverty within a few years. A watershed is a topographical region where rain and snowmelt come together and flow toward a common destination. Through our Watershed Model, we promote community organization, sustainable agriculture, and environmental stewardship at scale. By incorporating sustainable farming practices, we enhance soil health, purify water sources, and increase crop diversity and yields, leading to improved nutrition and higher income for families.

Economic Empowerment

Our programs aim to facilitate the **empowerment of individuals, families, and communities** by providing them with the skills, resources, and mindset required to break from the cycle of poverty. By fostering economic self-sufficiency through savings and loan groups, which we refer to as Purpose Groups, **we equip individuals, families, and entire communities to turn cycles of poverty into cycles of abundance.** In fiscal year 2023, we achieved this by launching 887 new Purpose Groups and strengthening 2,722 existing groups, including 289 graduating groups.

Purpose Groups are the cornerstone of our community engagement, uniting members for learning, collaboration, mutual support, and catalyzing positive change.

Participants join locally-led savings and loan groups, accessing financial services and literacy. Participants often use loans to improve their farms or for education, businesses, home improvements, or healthcare. Across nine country programs, members collectively hold \$12,218,105 USD in equity with an 18% return on savings. Group members learn sustainable agriculture techniques through Farmer Field Schools, improving their land and strengthening community bonds as they share practices. Purpose Groups instill hope and transform community mindsets, fostering environmental and social care.

Spiritual Renewal

Poverty encompasses more than just material needs; it also has a spiritual dimension. Our **Theory of Change places** a strong emphasis on spiritual transformation. Through collaboration with local churches, we offer leadership training and our Theology of Work curriculum. Participants receive spiritual guidance and mentorship, fostering resilience and strength in their faith, even in the face of adversity. In 2023, we expanded our network by cultivating 126 new church partnerships and reinforcing partnerships with 1,047 churches. Additionally, we hosted spiritual leadership training days with a cumulative attendance of 13,211. Through these activities, participants come to realize that their relationship with God deeply influences and connects to every aspect of their lives.








OUR GLOBAL IMPACT

With your continued partnership, we are dedicated to empowering farming families to restore the delicate balance of watershed ecosystems and foster the resilience needed to prosper in the face of a changing climate, political instability, and personal challenges.





PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

We believe that the relationships we nurture, from dedicated farmers to compassionate staff members to generous donors, are at the core of the transformative impact we have on both people and our planet. Just as Christ's teachings emphasize the value of loving and caring for one another, our work is a testament to the profound blessings that come from the relationships we cultivate. Together, we thrive and sow the seeds of hope, stewardship, and sustainable change.





Burundi: A major highlight in Burundi was our expanded partnership with HOPE International. During the initial phase of the partnership, we worked with 74 HOPE International savings groups to implement our agroecology curriculum, Seeds of Change. Our study showed a 20% reduction in multidimensional poverty among those using our curriculum, while the control group saw a 19% increase in poverty. This contrast highlights the substantial impact of our curriculum, indicating a 39% difference in poverty levels for Purpose Groups. We plan to engage 250 Purpose Groups in Burundi over the next two years through this partnership.



The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) has endured decades of conflict and instability, characterized by the presence of multiple armed groups in various regions. These conflicts have led to widespread violence, displacement, and a severe humanitarian crisis. Within the DRC program, a local committee has been established to promote peace within specific watersheds. This committee is composed of individuals from local communities, with the primary goal of resolving conflicts and increasing peace. Working in close partnership with the local government, this committee has made significant efforts to unite communities in their effort against acts of violence.

Dominican Republic: The Dominican Republic program has made a profound impact with the planting of 2.7 million trees, the formation of 110 new Purpose Groups and 20 new church partnerships, as well as the establishment of four new watershed projects. As part of our environmental stewardship efforts, the Dominican Republic program has partnered with One Tree Planted in utilization of a tree monitoring app.

Ethiopia: Amidst Ethiopia's social and political challenges, the growth of Purpose Groups has been substantial, with 256 new groups added, more than doubling the program's size. Partnering farmers planted more than 1.9 million seedlings, including trees, grasses, and shrubs, revitalizing the land. Notably, female participation has increased to 30%, a significant rise from the program's initial 14% in fiscal year 2018.

Haiti: In the midst of formidable challenges faced by everyone in Haiti, innovation prevails. With insecurity, inflation, and irregular rainfall posing extraordinary hurdles, the team's unwavering commitment shines. Our locally-led program model has enabled work to continue unabated at the regional level. In order to keep the team safe and reduce costs, local staff have taken many creative measures such as limiting travel and stockpiling fuel. Throughout these trials, the Haiti program team and partnering farmers remain vigilant and dedicated, demonstrating that resilience and innovation triumph even in the most trying circumstances.

Malawi: This fiscal year, we've made significant strides in our Malawi program under the leadership of Country Director Elizabeth Maneya. We've added seven new team members, including a program director, MEL specialist, and finance and HR personnel, following careful recruitment. Additionally, we're opening a new office space in Lilongwe, supporting team operations. These accomplishments pave the way for the establishment of a regional field office in Nkhata Bay where official program operations will launch in 2024.



Mexico: In southern Mexico, shifting rain patterns and prolonged drought have become a continual challenge. However, the team's determination and participant efforts have led them to exceed tree planting goals, partly due to the relief provided by irrigation initiatives. The participants' dedication showcases the resilience of local communities and their ability to adapt to changing environmental conditions, underscoring the program's commitment to sustainable solutions in the face of adversity.

Tanzania: In the Tanzania program, Purpose Groups are working together to address community needs. A noteworthy example from this year occurred in the Sanya watershed, where nine graduating Purpose Groups joined forces to support The Faraja Center, a nonprofit organization providing shelter and vocational training to vulnerable young single mothers. These groups collectively donated around \$200 USD worth of food and other items. This example demonstrates the power of Purpose Groups in fostering cooperation and making a positive impact on the well-being of the community.







Thailand: This fiscal year, the Thailand program reached a significant milestone with the graduation of the Huay Lu watershed. Plant With Purpose has not been actively involved in the Huay Lu watershed for the past two years. However, 75% of households in the area are still actively saving and participating in savings groups. Additionally, nearly all households (97%) report the existence of a community forest management plan.





LETTER FROM SCOTT SABIN

Chief Executive Officer


THIRTY YEARS AGO, when I was first hired part-time, I certainly did not expect this to become my life's work. However, I was motivated to help those in poverty, and I was drawn to the organization's unique mission combining faith and environmental restoration. Working with smallholder farmers to address rural poverty while restoring land has proven to be an effective win-win solution. Our watershed-focused approach maximizes ecological benefits, and we've seen positive economic and social changes, even for nonparticipants.

In recent years, our work gained recognition, attracting more funders

committed to measurable impact and benefiting from the growing interest in nature-based climate solutions. Despite some slowdown in 2023, we launched our ninth program in Malawi and expanded partnerships in Burundi. Globally, we added 11 new watersheds, with Thailand's Huay Lu watershed graduating from our program.

Furthermore, participating farmers planted nearly 10 million trees, and nearly 900 new Purpose Groups were launched.

However, the year was not without challenges. Civil unrest posed difficulties in several countries, particularly Haiti, Ethiopia, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.



Our local teams adapted and persevered. Funding also presented a challenge. While we celebrate our most successful year to date, the growth we targeted for fiscal year 2023 did not fully materialize. Fortunately, we had the resources to support the work and enter fiscal year 2024 with more modest goals while remaining prepared for rapid expansion if the opportunity arises.

The resilience of the global partner families we serve together continues to be an inspiration to me and a true example of resilience and hope. I am grateful for the support and prayers of our funders. This is truly a partnership that involves us all.
