THE TASTES

Food is an important part of any intenational experience. Whether you love to cook or not, we've got you covered!

EASY APPETIZERS

Chips and salsa, guacamole, chicarrones, and churros are tried-and-true options. Mexican appetizers such as frozen taquitos and mini tacos are available in many grocery stores and can be served with guacamole, bean or cheese dip.

BEVERAGES IDEAS

Horchata (sweet cinnamon Mock-a-rita" punch & vanilla rice drink) Jamaica (a hibiscus punch)

- 1 large can frozen limeade concentrate
- Lime Sherbet
- 1 liter sparkling water

Defrost limeade and dilute (to taste) with the soda and club soda. Add scoops of frozen sherbet. Best served in a punch

1 liter lemon-lime soda bowl and poured over ice

EASY QUESADILLAS

- Medium Flour Tortilla
- Grated cheddar or Mexican style cheese
- Shredded beef, pork or chicken (optional)

Layer cheese and other ingredients on the tortilla in a warm, non-stick pan. Top with another tortilla. Flip carefully when melted. Cut into triangles. Serve with salsa.

SÉ ADVENTURERO (BE ADVENTUROUS)

EASY CHICKEN MOLE

- 1 Jar Dona Maria Mole (directions on jar)
- 4 cups chicken broth
- ½ cup peanut butter
- 1 disc of Abuelita, Ibarra (Mexican Chocolate)
- Bone-in Chicken cooked pre-coooked tender or shredded rotisserie for enchiladas (add tortillas and cheese)
- Sesame seeds for garnish

Oaxaca is famous for mole, and while traditional mole takes hours and uses up to 40 ingredients, you can buy Mole starter in a jar at any Mexican market or the international food aisle. For an authentic taste of Oaxaca, consider preparing a simplified mole dish for your quests.

Once you make the sauce, it can be poured over, or simmered with cooked chicken for a more intense flavor. Serve with tortillas, spanish rice and beans if desired. Shredded, seasoned chicken can also be made into enchiladas topped with additional sauce and cheese.



TLAYUDA

- Corn or flour tortillas
- Refried beans
- Grated cheese (Oaxacan, cheddar or Mexican style)
- 1-3 tablespoons avocado or veg. oil
- Vegetables (suggestions: shredded lettuce, thin-sliced radishes, avocado, cilantro)
- ?Warm the beans and add water/oil to thin them to a spreadable paste
- 2. Prepare toppings (set aside)
- 3. Brown tortillas in a pan with oil and spread with beans
- 4. Top with cheese just covering the beans
- 5. Put tortillas on a parchment-lined baking sheet in 450 degree oven till cheese is melted (about 5 min.)
- 6. Top lightly with lettuce or cabbage and other vegetables and season with hot sauce to taste.
- 7. Cut if desired





DESSERT, ANYONE?

MEXICAN FLAN

1 can condensed milk 1 can evaporated milk 6 eggs 1 8oz pkg. of cream cheese 1 tsp vanilla 1 cup sugar

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees
- 2. Place sugar and water in saucepan, and boil at high heat until the sugar dissolves. (option: add 1-2 tsp. water if needed)
- 3. When the sugar dissolves, reduce the heat and keep boiling until the syrup becomes light brown caramel, ~10 minutes.
- 4. Pour the caramel into your oven-proof baking dish, swirling the caramel to cover the bottom of the dish evenly. Let cool.
- 5. Place the rest of the ingredients in a blender and process until smooth
- 6. Pour the mixture slowly into the prepared dish and cover with aluminum foil.
- 7. Place dish inside a large baking pan. Add warm water to the pan until it reaches about ¾ inch.
- 8. Place flan in the oven for 50 minutes or until firm. The flan will keep cooking while it cools, so do not leave it in longer.
- 9. Let it cool. Once the flan has cooled, run a knife between it and the dish and slice to serve..

PART TWO - FOOD & INTERACTIVE CHAPTER 2 VIDEOS

"Before we continue our journey let's stop and get some refreshments. No international trip is complete without sampling some of the local food, so go enjoy [share items that will be served]!"

Have guests eat their food, then visit the interactive video "passport stations."

After guests eat (20 min.) they will explore four stations (20 min total) to watch the interactive videos:

The Farmer Field School, The Church, The Purpose Group, and The Trees

The QR codes, when scanned, will open a video player for the 360° video. With earbuds in, sound and movement will create an immersive experience. Be mindful that some older phones might not have the capability for these 360° videos. Some device sharing may be needed. Have extra headphones on hand if possible.

While guests may start to mingle, encourage them to visit each station.

(After 20 minutes) "As you finish, please wander around the room. You will find signs with QR codes for The Church, The Purpose Group, The Trees, and The Farmer Field School. Scan the code with your phone in any order you like, and prepare to experience an immersive view of life in our Oaxacan village. You will want to have your earbuds in and try moving the camera around to get a complete view. We have a couple of extra headphone/adapters if needed."

We are getting ready to complete our journey and leave Oaxaca, but there are a few more things the Plant With Purpose team would like to share with you before we go.
